- keeping the service time succinct

- offering no communion at 9:30am on the 1st Sunday each month

I invite you to affirmatively embrace and support changes in these directions. For some of you there will be a cost, even a cross to bear, as we experiment with new ways of expressing our worship. Please pray for unity in the 9:30am congregation, and that the wider community will be drawn to worship with us because we are becoming a more inclusive and attractive church for families.

We are not changing our 8am Sunday service. This will continue to be a quiet, reflective Eucharist.



Warden's letter

My Christmas cakes are finally in the tins. I usually try to make them in Labour weekend. The weather was so great then that I worked in the garden instead, and I'd forgotten to buy the dried fruit. It takes time to make my cakes, a minimum of two days. I mull over the recipes from prior years, tinker with the quantities required for the fruit that I've stashed for this year's cakes then quietly and orderly I assemble the ingredients, weigh, wash, cut, soak, stir, stir again, divide the fruit into batches, double-line the tins, mix the cake batter, stir in the fruit and repeat the batches until all the fruit is baked.

I enjoy the making. I choose fruit that I like – for flavour and some for sentimental reasons. It's a mathematical challenge to work out the correct amount of batter to keep the mixture in proportion when I've overloaded the fruit content. The smell takes over the house for days. I enjoy eating it and sharing it with friends.

I've also been busy with several working bees, gardening, tree felling, and helping out at the Vicarage. Thank-you to all the other helpers too. I hope that you enjoyed your days out. We make a wonderful team. Thank you to Hugh and Carolyn Cordery for organising and leading the work at the Vicarage. Thank you to Jacqui Lowe for liaising with all the trades-people over the unexpected plumbing job. We've one last working bee this year from 9am on Saturday 20 December to clean the church ready for Christmas. You can pick any job, from dusting, polishing, cleaning and gardening, and it's so much quicker with lots of helpers.

I'm really looking forward to having my family all together for Christmas. It's also time to enjoy some holidays and reflect as another year passes. I might even manage to finally plant my potatoes. I wish you all a happy and joyous Christmas.

Literacy Programme at Otari School

The Literacy Programme at Otari School began in 2000. This year there have been 10 volunteers, two from St Annes, four from St Lukes and the other volunteers are people who live in Wadestown or Wilton but are not members of either congregation. The convenor is Liz Dovey from St Lukes.

During 2015 the groups of children have come from four classes ranging in age from 5 - 12 years. The teacher selects the children and the books for the programme. Each child either stays in the classroom or goes to the library and reads to the volunteer for 10 - 15 minutes depending on the child's age and ability. The volunteers do one turn a week or relieve when someone is unable to help.

All of the team enjoy working with the children and we shall look forward to hearing from Otari School what their needs will be in 2016.



Messy Church in November: Remembering



It was our last Messy Church for the year on 15 November. Our theme was remembering (Psalm 137: 1-8). We looked at the story of the Israelites who were taken captive from their land and ended up living in Babylon, a long way from home. It is a little bit like the people who are forced out of their own countries today because of civil war. Because they were far away, they got homesick and sat down by the river and cried. They sang out to God about their sadness and eventually He brought them back to their land so they could build new lives again.

Katherine talked about how it is good to have emotions like sadness and anger and we can share those emotions with God. We wrote about things that make us sad or angry on paper tear drops and put them on a special tree. We made patterns with felt tips and dropped liquid "tears" on them to make beautiful patterns. We also made musical instruments like harps just like the Israelites used to sing their sadness out to God. And we tried to see how many crackers we could eat without water. This reminded us that the Psalm talked about the sadness of the Israelites being like having their tongues stick to the roof of their mouths.

Bishop's Letter December 2015

Posted on 17 November 2015

*A voice is heard in Ramah,
mourning and great weeping,
Rachel weeping for her children
And refusing to be comforted,
because they are no more.*

Jeremiah 31:15



Over the weekend, news has broken yet again of violence inflicted on a mass scale – this time on Western soil. The horror experienced by the people of Paris is unconscionable. In God's world, no one should be huddling in silence in the basement of a concert hall, holding hands with strangers, and praying not to be found by gunmen. Pregnant women should not have to cling to the outside of first-storey windows, taking the chance that a fall to the street below might be the safer option than to stay indoors. And let us not forget that these atrocities for many in our world are an all too regular occurrence.

This week, Wellington hosts the New Zealand Defence Industry Association conference – where 200 of the world's largest weapons manufacturers will be represented. New Zealand can't claim not to be complicit in the ongoing cycle of global violence.

This is a grim way to begin this Bishop's News! But as we lead into Advent and Christmas perhaps we can look with fresh eyes at the all-encompassing love of God through the redemptive suffering of our saviour Jesus. He reached beyond boundaries of nationhood in the way he engaged with those around him and ultimately commissioned his followers to do the same. He subverted Messianic expectations of a military leader and chose the path of non-violence – and it wasn't just

the case that he had no other choice. We read his words in Matthew's gospel [26:53]: 'Do you think I cannot call on my Father, and he will at once put at my disposal more than twelve legions of angels' (which in the Roman context of his day represented around 60,000).

Jesus' outstretched arms on the cross gave us his final earthly symbol of God's grace for all people, and we are given the hope that this is not the end of the story...

In the face of global terror it's easy to feel that there is nothing we can do. Yet every time we face up to injustice and hypocrisy within ourselves and in our conversations with others, we edge closer to where God calls us to be. When we choose to use our intellect wisely to inform ourselves about global events, we do likewise. When we lobby and pray for our leaders to make peaceful decisions; when we give our support to those in crisis regardless of their racial or religious background – then we share Jesus' message of all-encompassing love.

And at the end of the day, God transforms his world from the inside out. So when we plead with him for peace within ourselves, that particular fruit of his Spirit ripples out from each one of us. We may not feel that we are doing much, but we are not alone – we have 'him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us'. [Ephesians 3:20]

May God bless us and our leaders as we seek to find new ways to heal deep wounds and bring peace to his world.

On a much more positive note, this Saturday our ordinands for diaconate and priesthood are presented at the Cathedral. Please keep them all in your prayers as they go on retreat from Thursday. May their lives be richly blessed as they fulfil the vocation to which God has called them.


This month we focused on the Spiritual Goals and discussed ways to action some of the ideas raised in the parish consultancy. We agreed:
