HANDYPERSONS ROSTER



One of the things people find useful at St Anne's is our handypersons roster —a list of volunteers who can do odd jobs around the house or garden for seniors and others who need this.

These are the little jobs around home (sweeping drives, fixing tap washers, clearing gutters): the jobs that are too small for tradespeople to want to do them. This sounded like a good way for us to help the community we are part of—a way of being 'the church at the heart of the community'.

WARDEN'S LETTER

Dear Friends

As I write this, another one of our perfect Summer days is coming to an end. It's been a wonderful season for getting outside, even though the gardens are now beginning to dry out and a little rain would be welcome!

That's something I like about living in this part of the world – the fact that we have four seasons – relatively distinctly different – with their own flowers, leaf colours, different types of food readily available, and needing to wear different clothes. I've never been sure that I'd like to live in less varied climates – having long runs of hot sunny days (like in Saudi Arabia) or seeing snow all the time (like in Antarctica). Change and variety –even when it is relatively predictable – is, as they say, 'the spice of life!

As we come up to another parish AGM, change is also in the air. As you'll see elsewhere in Northern View, this will be my last Warden's letter. I've been People's Warden for six years and it's time for a new 'season'. (Quite rightly, the Diocesan rules limit the amount of time someone can serve in the same position.) That means it is time to look around and ask ourselves "what do we want in a new People's Warden"- "what are the skills and attributes this person should have"? When I have observed other Wardens, I see that the way each person approaches it is quite varied. Nevertheless, whoever takes on the role will make a difference to the governance team in the parish.

At this beginning of the year, there are other opportunities to make change – first through our regular Visioning Day when we put on the agenda the changes we believe will build up God's presence in our community. The conclusions from the Visioning Day will be confirmed at the AGM, which is also the time when the new vestry will be voted in, and we have a chance to receive the reports of the different groups within the parish. So please prayerfully consider these opportunities and how you can be part of change here at St Anne's.

Bishop's Letter (December)

Greetings Family

200 years ago in Oihi Samuel Marsden preached the first sermon in New Zealand; joining with the angels in the Christmas story to proclaim “I bring you glad tidings of great joy” (Luke 2:10).

What is this “glad tidings”?

That God’s Kingdom is breaking into our world. That there is an alternative; our future is no longer dictated by our past. In a world caught in cycles of retaliatory violence there is a Kingdom where lion and lamb will lie down together. In a country where one in four children grow up in poverty there is a Kingdom where the King cares so much he is born as a child into a stable, into a context of child genocide and as a refuge. In a world caught in destructive patterns of domestic violence there is a Kingdom where Joseph does the right thing and faithfully serves and loves Mary even though the child is not his. There is a Kingdom which is good news.

How does God’s Kingdom come? It comes because God chose to enter our world as a child. He doesn’t come in power but instead in a vulnerable, costly and personal way. The scandal of this Kingdom is that the King of “the last becoming the first” lives this himself. God’s Kingdom is the way it is because it reflects God’s nature and character, a God who transforms the world through personal costly vulnerability.

This Christmas will you join with Samuel Marsden and the angels in proclaiming these glad tidings of great news? Will you join with the God child in transforming the world through the giving of yourself by becoming vulnerable and personally involved to see his Kingdom come in our neighbourhoods afresh this Advent?

May the Christ child enter your world this Advent.

The Diocesan Lenten Study focuses on a key Diocesan theme for 2015: the Last, Lost & Least.



Sharing the Good News with the Least, Last and Lost is a six-part study series written by Wayne Kirkland from Naenae-Epuni Parish. Each study begins with a short story and reflective question/s which serves as a brief introduction. Scripture is drawn mainly from the Gospels of Mark and Luke. The studies work for both group discussion & individual study.

Our Lenten Studies are on Wednesdays at 8pm (following the 7.30pm Eucharist) beginning with an Introduction on Ash Wednesday 18 February.

The six studies are:


• Good News	25 February

ASH WEDNESDAY - 18 February

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of **Lent**, the season of preparation & penitence leading up to Easter. It's a time when we focus on God, a kind of pilgrimage, a journey towards Good Friday & Easter Day.

Historically a time of fasting, the emphasis today is even more on being quiet before God, giving to help those less fortunate than ourselves & spending more time in prayer & other religious activities—‘giving up something for Lent’ or taking on something new. Ash Wednesday gets its name from the custom of marking on the forehead the sign of the cross in ashes, as a symbol of the frailty & uncertainty of human life, & as a sign of penitence.
