Building on this idea, the Neighbourly website helps people connect with their local community. There is a desire to be connected.

Our Christian understanding helps us figure out where this desire for community comes from. 'In the beginning...'. Yes we go back to the book of Genesis, where God created man. God pretty soon said it's not good for man to be alone. And then some, probably half the population(!), would argue that God made a better version of man and provided him a companion, woman. A particular highlight was hosting several young families connected to Messy Church for afternoon tea, which was a wonderful form of organised chaos!

It is still true today, humanity is not created to be alone. Isolation and loneliness has become all too common. Part of our calling and vocation then is to seek out the last, least and lost, that people would know that they are accepted, included and valued. God loves each one of us and desires us to be in relationship with Him and others.

Recently we had Trinity Sunday. This led me on a trip down memory lane to when I was 29 and travelling through Europe by myself. The approach I was taking was three nights in each city to allow two full days of intense sightseeing. I was over a month into the trip when I was sick of palaces, castles, museums, art galleries, the cathedrals and walking everywhere.

I needed a break to refresh my soul. I happened to be in Austria at the time in Salzburg. I decided to head to a lake. After the kind hostel receptionist taking pity on me and booking me into accommodation (none of the potential hosts spoke English) I headed to a lake with a famous painting in a church.

I walked in the sunshine around the lake's edge. I was too cheap at the time to take the bus to the church when I could walk. However, walking today was different. I appeared more like a local on the route I took. People in this small place said hello as I walked by. The lake gently lapped against the shore in the most relaxing way.

I got to my destination to see a triptych of the Trinity in a little church perched on the side of the hill with a courtyard overlooking the lake. I paid my entry fee and headed inside the church for tranquillity, and coolness. I don't remember a lot about the triptych despite looking at it for around an hour. It was dark and there were patches of light that appeared to glow. I don't even remember the famous artist.

I do remember the little church and how it was inside – very little furniture with the triptych open. The church was painted pink on the outside like our Cathedral. Most of all I remember how I felt. It refreshed my soul. I got what I was missing in

my rushing round the cities. I listened to what I was being told and I felt better for it.

Afterwards I headed out into the summer heat with a renewed spring in my step and tranquillity in my soul. I happily hiked up the hill and back to the hostel to the staff that didn't speak any English with the patience to cope.

The art was obviously not that memorable in the end but the journey to see and seeing the artist's representation of the Trinity helped me physically and spiritually to be at peace. Do you have a memory of being moved by the spirit?

Our St.Anne's Fair for 15th October 2016 - Exciting New Venture

At the May meeting Vestry opted to accept the proposal relocating our main 2016 Fair to our St. Anne's site. If you'd like to discuss this please talk to a Vestry person.

Some prior consultation amongst parishioners had taken place.

The main reasons given for the change were

- easier set up and pull down, not having to transport material to another venue
- St Anne's are building a good local profile, which having the Fair at our own building would reinforce
- gain greater interest from local foot traffic - both intentional and unintentional shoppers
- better access to the kitchen facilities, having two access points, and to our kitchen crockery and cutlery
- the area in front of the church and hall can be used for stalls, including the garden stall. If we could access a

gazebo or similar, this could provide shelter in case of bad weather. The disabled toilet could be used as a changing area

- the back of the church could have appropriate activities eg book stall; live music ; music stall. St Michael's of Kelburn does this successfully
- using the St Anne's facilities would incur no extra costs compared to the proposed charges for Community Centre hire.

What about the smaller indoor space?

- Quality rather than quantity may mean we need less physical space indoors. 2015 fair made some moves from quantity to quality which increased profits eg delicatessen, craft, garden stall. The March 2016 Nursery sale had fewer customers but made a greater profit due to better quality of goods.
- Some ideas for Fair 2016 include : Books; Boutique adult's clothes; Car wash; Car rides; Children's toys and books; Children's wear; Craft; Delicatessen; Face painting/ balloons; Garden; Linen; Magazine; Morning teas and lunches; Music; Sausage sizzle; Waffles; Anyone have a pony??? ☺

What about our White Elephant and Clothes stalls?

- The Northland socio-economic demographic is upwardly mobile. With an increase in charity shops in Kelburn and Karori there seems to be little demand for a junk sale. In 2015 we earned less from these stalls than previously.
- We plan to ask contributors to hold on to most of the material previously used for the White Elephant stall for an enlarged Flatter's / Household Goods / Car boot sale in late Jan / Feb 2017.

Prepare now Planning has started. There will be meetings soon to further develop plans. Please keep stalls in mind. Do start making, preserving, growing, sorting, organising.

Bishop's Letter May 2016

Thank you so much to all those who held General Synod in your prayers over the last few weeks, and last week in particular. It has been a long, tiring period for all involved, and the failure of Tikanga Pakeha to move forward on this issue is disappointing. There are many people in our Diocese and beyond who are grieving at this time and I ask you to continue to uplift them in prayer.

The issue has not been helped by media misreporting – in particular noting ‘bitter opposition’ between Wellington, Nelson and Christchurch Dioceses, and the false accusation that Wellington General Synod representatives were not prepared to move forward. I would like to state that this is categorically untrue – our deep desire was to move forward in the spirit of Motion 30; acknowledging two diversities of opinion. However, we were not prepared to move forward at the expense of the schism of our Province, and ultimately Dioceses with opposing viewpoints could not come to a consensus at this time.

There will be additional public meetings held around the Diocese to provide you with feedback and hear your thoughts following General Synod – please keep an eye on *Movement Online* for these dates and times.

I am so proud of our General Synod team – to Simon Winn and Kaz Young, thank you for your work fighting communication and social media fires; to Kim Duxfield for her speaking on behalf of Chaplaincy on the confirmation motion; to David Kendall with his AV assistance and Tony Hill with his legal advice; to Wendy Scott, at the centre of numerous motions, and Julie Rokotakala, holding the fort as Vicar General in my absence.

There were so many other things to be proud of at General Synod too – work around climate change; addressing historic grievances between Tikanga; witnessing the grace of many people of opposing viewpoints who spoke humbly and filled with the Spirit.

It was wonderful to have Bishop John Pritchard, former Bishop of Oxford, attending General Synod with us; providing us with his wisdom and always keeping us focussed on Jesus. Night Prayer this week has featured the lectionary readings of Romans 1, and verse 16 leapt out at me in the light of Bishop Pritchard's teaching during the week: 'For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile'. With confidence let us keep the Gospel of Jesus central to everything we do.

In other news, it was such a privilege to be a part of the opening of Samuel Marsden Collegiate's new buildings last Wednesday. Thank you to Marsden for their amazing hospitality. Prime Minister John Key also attended – I couldn't possibly comment as to whether he was so rattled by my prayers that he got himself kicked out of the debating chamber later that day!

Several Vestry members subsequently attended an introductory session about 3DM at the Diocese.

Vestry discussed then approved a proposal to host this year’s fair at St Anne’s on Saturday 15 October. Please refer to the article on page 4 for more information about this decision.

Vestry also Approved acceptance of the quote to replace the butanol on the foyer roof.




